The month of January is a month named after the Roman god Janus, an appropriate personification of the start of the new year. This particular Roman god had two faces so that he could look ahead toward the future and back at the past at the same time. As we get rid of an old year and look forward to a new one, we all try to be a little like Janus. We know through experience what we did wrong and what we did right, and hope to do better this year. Some people make ambitious new year's resolutions; others just take a deep breath and hope for the best...."

Whether you've just walked through the greatest year of your life, or are incredibly glad to see it finally over, one truth still rings clear amidst it all. You are not alone. Not ever.

The Gospel of Matthew tells us that Joseph, when he was concerned about his coming year and trying to come to terms with what was seemed to be an impossible problem in his life, the angel told him that Mary, his pregnant betrothed "will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfil what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: "Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and his name shall be called Emman'u-el" (which means, God with us).
